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




Rockwall lost a friend this Spring. Saundra Cullins Holland was a wife, mother, sister, friend and a "constant presence in the lives of many" as was so eloquently stated during her service.

What made Saundra special to her family and our community? She was the type of person that many strive to be – honest, loving,

But, most importantly, Saundra had a fierce love of God, family and friends – and as she neared her final days was "committed, confirmed and content."

Jennifer Reinhart Rainey became friends with Saundra in 1978 when they were in high school. They worked together at Rockwall Success, the local newspaper at that time, and often babysat together. Sharing many memories, laughter and experiences over the years, Jennifer remembers her friend as "one of a kind", fondly remembering that Saundra had a way about her. She could cut her eyes at you, and you knew immediately what she meant.

Saundra Cullins Holland left her mark on Rockwall – its past, present and surely its future – because of the impact she made on the people in her life. Saundra showed others how to live and live big. She especially showed others how to love – and love is eternal.



Sowing Seeds with Rockwall's Butterfly Brigade

Brigade, originally formed in 2016 out of Laura Bush's movement to save

the monarch butterfly, recently kicked off their spring season and is sowing seeds of growth.

While Ms. Bush's pledge focused on the declining population of monarchs, the purpose of the pledge and our local brigade is to create habitats that allow all pollinators such as butterflies, bees, moths, and other important insects to thrive. While some may find pollinators a nuisance, the reality is they play an important role in the reproduction of flowering plants, vegetables and fruits! Our world would not be the same without the pollinators!

What started locally with a couple small gardens now includes 40 active volunteers, seven gardens (with irrigation sources) and one meadow, which does not include irrigation. You may view the gardens at Pettinger, Breezy Hill, Harry Myers, North Shore, The Shores, Emerald Bay and Hickory Ridge and the meadow at Stone Creek. Cleverly marked with butterfly "signs" created by Rockwall ISD art students, you can see for yourself some of their work in progress. Here you will see many variations of plants and flowers including milkweed, a known favorite of pollinators.

The Butterfly Brigade, which serves




a volunteer offshoot of the Rockwall Parks Department, held a Spring workday on April 1. Volunteers ventured out to the gardens and meadow cutting back dead growth and plants that didn't survive winter and planting new seeds to refresh the pollinator habitats. As Mary Carter, who has helped coordinate the brigade, says, "it's all about the pollinators!"

Fall is the best time for planting with spring and summer dedicated to maintenance and

reaping the rewards of their work. And you can be certain that next year, as winter begins to settle in passionate volunteers will be thinking ahead to spring.

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Open Spaces: The importance of preservation

the bottom floor of the Rockwall County Historical Courthouse, there are two

framed pictures. Each is an aerial photo of a portion of the City of Rockwall and surrounding areas, one taken in 1971; the other in 2021. The differences over 50 years are remarkable! Areas that were once Open Spaces are now fully developed with houses. businesses and roads. Another aerial photograph taken by a friend, Clark Staggs, shows a large subdivision with dense housing on land previously used for farming or ranching.

To an extent, development is inevitable. I would guess that most people reading this article, like me, were not Rockwall County residents in

1971, and property development allowed us to move here. Mary and I moved to Heath in 1986. At that time Heath's population was less than 2,000 and Rockwall County's total population was less than 25,000, and we found the suburban/rural mix that was perfect for our family.

However, as people continue moving into our County, we face the challenge of balancing the rights of private property owners to use and develop their property, with the goal of our local governments to ensure development of communities consistent with residents' desires. This is a delicate balancing act. In the past, most significant development issues involved land within city limits, and city governments have worked to determine appropriate development guidelines. However, recent legislation passed in Austin has shifted the focus of many developers to land in the County, but outside of city limits, often through the use of Municipal Utility Districts

(MUDs). As the development Aerial photo by Clark Staggs. debate shifts to the County government, it is important to recognize that Rockwall County's priorities have already been determined regarding the importance of Open Spaces.

In 2008, the Rockwall County Commissioners Court adopted a policy position on Open Space, stating that "The dynamics of Rockwall County's geography and its rapid population growth present a very small window of opportunity to act on the quality of its future. Therefore, our future is now." Three primary objectives related to Open Spaces were identified: (1) to preserve quality stormwater corridors (i.e., protect floodplains and greenbelts); (2) to protect and establish corridors essential for countywide open space connectivity for non-motorized mobility modes (i.e., build trails); and (3) to explore development of a major preserve/public amenity that could potentially be developed in the future (i.e., develop a large public park).

The Commissioners Court subsequently commissioned a study on Open Spaces, which culminated in the issuance of the Rockwall County Open Space Master Plan in December 2015. The Master Plan was developed by an Executive Committee and a Steering Committee that included concerned citizens from throughout our County, and was delivered to the Commissioners Court with great anticipation that action would be taken to achieve the goals and objectives specified in the Master Plan – goals and objectives that were generally agreed upon by Rockwall County residents. For example, the Master Plan stated that 95% of survey respondents indicated that it would be beneficial to have a connected trail network linking key locations across the County.








include significant Open Spaces in future developments, and support efforts to keep control of development at the local level. Those efforts include legislation introduced by State Representative Justin Holland, and recently endorsed by our Commissioners Court, to limit the development of MUDs without County approval. Local governments answer to local citizens, and must be given the authority and assume the responsibility to make sure that development is

One more resource is the Rockwall County Open Space Alliance, a 501(c)(3) nonprofit organization, which is dedicated to protecting Rockwall County's Open Spaces and connecting communities through Open Spaces. The Alliance can work with the County to




that development within the County incorporates the goals of the Master Plan in order to preserve the rural, open environment that we all enjoy. We must encourage our County Commissioners to work with landowners to

The Rose Table: Run for the Roses with a **Classic Mint Julep**



As an avid equestrian and horse owner, the Kentucky Derby is one of my favorite days of the year. Any excuse to wear a fascinator and drink bourbon, I love!

When planning a Derby party, there are several musts: red roses (it is, after all, the Run for the Roses!), southern food, mint juleps, and fabulous fashion. Part of the fun of any good Derby party is admiring the outfits.

For my Derby party, I styled the table with large silver equestrian trophies filled with red roses, a white lace tablecloth, white lace napkins, and red rose napkin rings. I even built a rose wall for less than \$200 using plywood, Astro turf, and rose garlands that I've since used for many garden parties.



I have tons of Derby recipes on therosetable.com under Entertaining -> Kentucky Derby such as Mint Julep Brownies, Southern Style Green Beans, Chicken and Waffles with Pimento Cheese and Bourbon Maple Syrup, Southern Tomato Pie, Deviled Eggs, and more – but the most important recipe of all is a classic Mint Julep. Here's The Rose Table's version.

Mint Julep

- 2 oz bourbon 1/2 oz mint simple syrup (recipe follows)
- 3 mint sprigs Finely crushed ice
- Fill mint julep glasses with crushed ice and a straw. Pour bourbon and simple syrup over ice. Garnish with mint sprig.

2 cups sugar • 2 cups water • 1/2 cup fresh mint leaves

Bring sugar, water, and mint leaves to a boil in a small sauce pan until sugar is completely dissolved. Cool and strain to remove the mint leaves.

Mint Julep Pitcher

1 cup mint simple syrup • 4 cups bourbon

Torn mint leaves • Crushed ice, mint sprigs for serving

 Pour mint simple syrup and bourbon in a pitcher and stir. Add torn mint leaves. Serve with crushed ice and mint sprigs.

Bring the family, a blanket and picnic lunch – even a fishing pole for the catch-and-release pond – and explore the mesmerizing magic of the property. 


other photo opportunities abound throughout the property as well.

Someone's Knocking at the Door

Suspense movies often include them. Amusement parks feature them in a range of shapes, sizes, and colors to fit a particular theme.

Photographers and antique buyers like old doors. Homeowners prefer on further adventures. new ones. They will replace their

original, builder-installed front door to fit their style – from grand to minimalistic.

We are also intrigued by the intangible doors, and most of us appreciate the one that's open. Jnless we're a confirmed hermit, we like to be invited, welcomed, chosen. This open door could be an opportunity or prospect such as a college acceptance, or a new relationship that fills a void. It might be another job to replace a lost or unpleasant one.

However, when opportunity knocks, we will face a challenge if more than one door beckons us. Consider for example the job search that yields two good offers. While both appeal to us, each will take us in a different direction. Knowing our future is at stake, we may lose sleep as we consider which one to choose.

In the late '80s film, Indiana Jones and The Last Crusade, the hero is faced with a life-or-death choice. From among a large selection of ancient drinking goblets before him, Jones must select the chalice that

If there's anything that symbolizes a new adventure, it's a door. Jesus supposedly drank from. He watches as his companion grabs an ornate cup such as a king might have used, drinks from it, and quickly dies. The observant hero pauses to consider the humility of Christ, selects the simplest cup, and (of course) lives to embark

Jesus uses simple wording to invite us into the kingdom of Heaven, saying, "I am the door of the sheep... If anyone enters by me, he will be saved and will go in and out and find pasture" (John 10:7, 9*); "Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears my voice and opens the door. I will come in to him and eat with him, and he with me" (Revelation 3:20).

Our conundrum in accepting this invitation comes as we consider some of his other words, such as, "Do not love the world or the things in the world" (1 John 2:15). While we truly desire the eternal kingdom Jesus offers, we may struggle against the beguiling refrains of the here-and-now: Follow your heart! Live your own truth!

Many sincere folks will tell us the kingdom of God is already ours via other means sacred tradition, personal goodness, zeal for God, or through revering a certain religious icon. However, any of these supposed ladders to Heaven negate the exclusive claim of Jesus, who said, "I am the way, and the truth, and the life. No one comes to the Father except through me" (John 14:6).

There are dearer reasons that make us pause at the door Jesus has placed before us. Friends and family members we love may resent or even ridicule our desire to follow Christ. Embracing the gospel means turning away from the pleasant-looking, popular path. "Enter by the narrow gate. For the gate is wide and the way is easy that leads to destruction" (Matthew 7:13).

Entering the narrow gate requires that we humble ourselves through repenting of our sins and believing in Jesus Christ (Acts 20:21). This choice will mark the culmination of our futile search for meaning and bring us to "the new and living way that he opened for us" (Hebrews 10:20). Eternal life is the one
